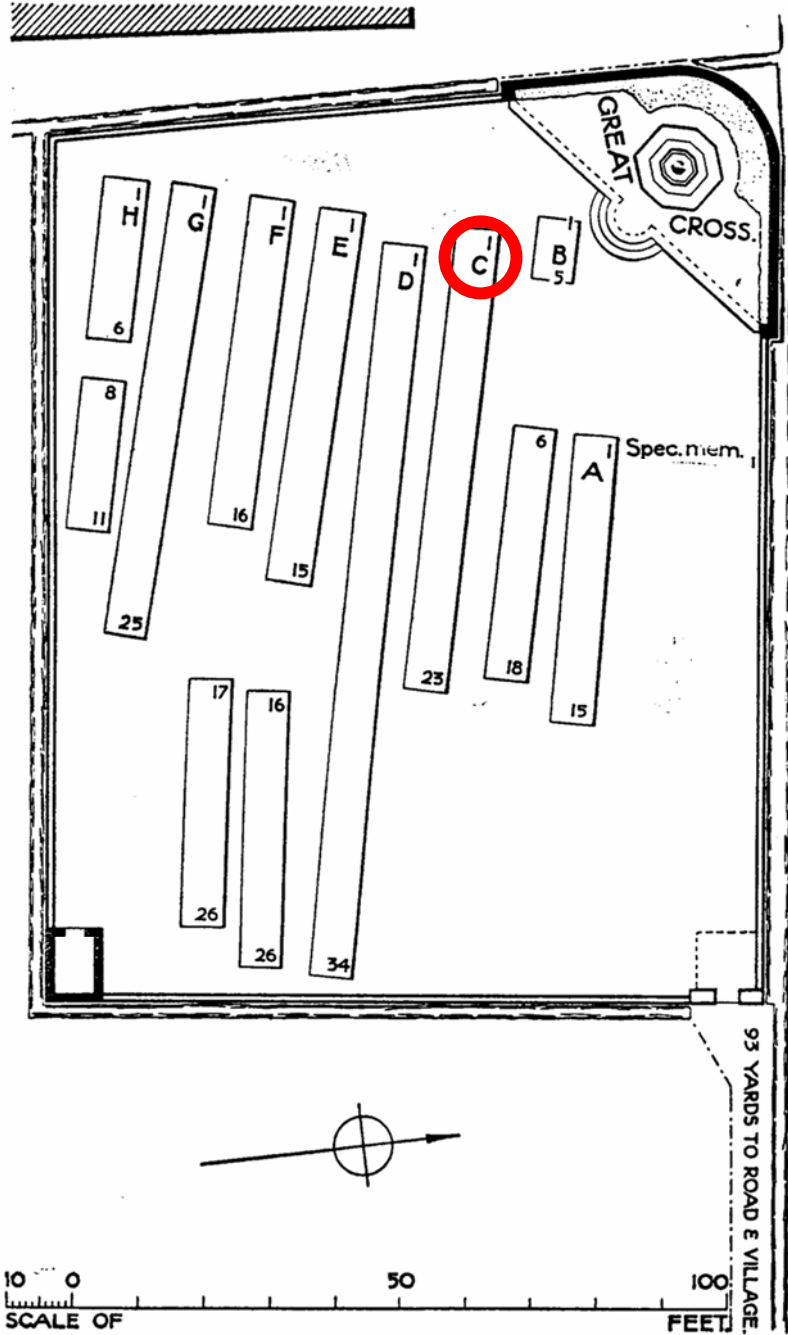
Location Information: Bazentin is in the Department of the Somme, to the north-east of Albert, containing the villages of Bazentin-le-Grand and Bazentin-le-Petit. Take the D929 (Albert-Bapaume road) from Albert and travel 8 kilometres. In the village of Pozieres, turn south onto the D73 to Bazentine and the village of Bazentin-le-Petit is 3 kilometres further on. The Military Cemetery will be found on the west side of the village.

Historical Information: Bazentin was in German hands until 14 July 1916 when the 3rd and 7th Divisions captured the two villages (and the communal cemetery) and held them against counter-attacks, and the 21st Division captured Bazentin-le-Petit Wood. The ground was lost in April 1918 during the great German advance but recaptured on the following 25 August by the 38th (Welsh) Division. The military cemetery was begun at the end of July 1916 and used as a front-line cemetery until May 1917. It contains 182 First World War burials, 15 of them unidentified.

The Allied Victory Medal

Also known as 'Wilfred'

It was decided that each of the allies should each issue their own bronze victory medal with a similar design, similar equivalent wording and identical ribbon.

The British medal was designed by W. McMillan. The front depicts a winged classical figure representing victory.

Approximately 5.7 million victory medals were issued. Interestingly, eligibility for this medal was more restrictive and not everyone who received the British War Medal ('Squeak') also received the Victory Medal ('Wilfred'). However, in general, all recipients of 'Wilfred' also received 'Squeak' and all recipients of 'Pip' also received both 'Squeak' and 'Wilfred'.

The recipient's service number, rank, name and unit was impressed on the rim.



The British War Medal 1914 - 1918

Established on 26th July 1919.

Also known as '*Squeak*'.

The silver or bronze medal was awarded to officers and men of the British and Imperial Forces who either entered a theatre of war or entered service overseas between 5th August 1914 and 11th November 1918 inclusive. This was later extended to services in Russia, Siberia and some other areas in 1919 and 1920.

Approximately 6.5 million British War Medals were issued.

Approximately 6.4 million of these were the silver versions of this medal.

Around 110,000 of a bronze version were issued mainly to Chinese, Maltese and Indian Labour Corps. The front (obv or obverse) of the medal depicts the head of George V.

The recipient's service number, rank, name and unit was impressed on the rim.

The Allied Victory and British War Medals awarded to Private Tyson

During the past month, we have received the sad news that another of our Longton lads has been killed. Private B. Tyson, who before the war broke out was on our Postal Staff, offered his services at the very commencement of hostilities, but was refused on medical grounds. He succeeded however in joining the Loyal North Lancashire Regiment under the Derby Group system. He spent several months in France and before he met his death, he had some marvellous escapes. On one occasion he was knocked senseless by a bursting shell and on another he was buried along with his companions and was the only one who was dug out alive. We tender our deepest sympathy to his father and near relatives.

Private B. Tyson, Loyal North Lancs Regt., formerly on the postal staff at Longton has been killed. He had previously had narrow escapes, once being rendered senseless by a bursting shell, while on another occasion he was buried along with his companions and was the only one dug out alive.

Benjamin Tyson Snr. was a joiner by trade.

Mr. T. Gaskell was a local Longton tradesman engaged in property work. It is probable that Tyson was an employee who lodged with him or in a nearby rented property on Liverpool Road, Longton, and therefore paid for his funeral being that Tyson was a man of little means.

Benjamin Tyson Jun. is described in Penwortham St. Mary's parish magazine as "another of our Longton lads" and therefore it is reasonable to assume he is living with his father in a property on Liverpool Road.
